Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

The ENVS BA includes an area for Inter-disciplinary electives. Students must choose 2 courses (for a total of 6 units) from other Departments. The purpose of this proposal is to update the list of acceptable courses to include the new course in Global Environmental History, HIST 139A, alongside HIST 165.

The objective of the change is two-fold:

1. to not unnecessarily constrain entry into the ENVS Major, and
2. provide students greater flexibility and diversity in their learning about environmental studies by the inclusion of the social sciences (e.g., politics, economics) and humanities (e.g., history) and how they are applied in Environmental Studies.

This insert will also help our program meet 4 and 5 of its learning objectives (listed below in the "Objectives of the degree program").

Objectives of the degree program:

1. Ability to assess environmental problems and solutions by applying scientific concepts.
2. Ability to write and speak clearly and persuasively.

The Environmental Studies program can help students use the resources of the entire University to gain an interdisciplinary understanding of such increasingly serious issues as pollution, wildlife and wilderness preservation, land use, biodiversity loss, resource depletion, energy conservation, and a generally healthful relationship between nature and society.

The major is designed to help students understand environmental issues in their political, social, and scientific context. Because dealing with environmental issues requires an interdisciplinary approach, we emphasize the development of strong writing, research, and quantitative skills and a broad liberal arts perspective.
