Justification for course proposal:

This course is being updated as part of larger changes to the Anthropology major. ANTH 162 has traditionally served as the sole linguistic anthropology course in the major's upper div core requirements (whereas for other required core categories, several courses which can fulfill a given core req are offered on a rotating basis). For this and other reasons, including the retirement of additional ling faculty in 2018, this course has become a bottleneck to students' progression in the major. Now that we have hired a second ling faculty member, we are reimagining this aspect of the curriculum in alignment with the other upper div core categories, as an expanded suite of possible courses (for now, just ANTH 162 and ANTH 160) that can fulfill the requirement.

This update also brings these linguistic anthro course offerings in line with disciplinary standards. It was my understanding when I inherited these courses that ANTH 162 was intended as a broad survey course, and ANTH 160 as focusing on theory and the role of linguistic anthropology in the discipline at large. In practice, the current catalog descriptions are both so vague as to be difficult to distinguish from one another, and focus unduly on ways of approaching language (like historical linguistics) which have never been central to the discipline. As only a tiny fraction of our majors are headed for graduate study in the anthropology, we are reimagining these courses along thematic lines that are better aligned with both current and enduring expectations in the field, and with student's everyday lives, interests, and broad post-matriculation goals.

While ANTH 160 and 162 will now both center around aspects of language and identity at the core of the discipline, ANTH 162 will focus primarily on how language is leveraged in the reproduction of power and inequalities, especially at the intersection of institutional power and individual possibilities. Even if students never take another linguistic anthropology course, this theme permits exposure to a range of ling anth theoretical frameworks and studies in contexts as diverse as classrooms, medical clinics, carceral systems, governing bodies, and social media spaces the world over, and provides portable insights into the role of language and power in students' own lives, experiences, and future trajectories.

Summary of changes:

- 1) significantly updated course description to align with disciplinary standards, how the course has increasingly been taught, and new curricular shifts;
 - 2) name change to reflect new course focus;
 - 3) classification change from lecture/recitation to lecture/discussion to better reflect course structure (K factor remains the same);
 - 4) updated ELOs & syllabus;
 - 5) changed to exam room not required (final project rather than exam)

Course examines the notion that language is a critical means of reproducing systems of inequality, and a vital resource in recognizing and subverting those inequalities. Explores how ideologies about language and its use intersect with racialized, classed, gendered,

and other understandings of 'good' citizens & selves across global contexts. Through such topics as 'Standard' languages and literacies, raciolinguistics, multilingualism, codeswitching, and language reclamation, students will develop the capacity to recognize patterns of language subordination and encourage linguistic diversity & justice in their own lives.
