## Awards and Recognition

1. 2018 California Secretary of State - *Ballot Bowl* Winners for Creative Outreach.
2. Certificate of Recognition from Assembly member Kevin McCarty for Sac State Students winning the CSU Civic Challenge.
3. First Place Winners in the Cal State Student Association's Civic Challenge alongside ASI - CSU Channel Islands.
4. Sacramento State made history as the only California university with a Vote Center on its campus for the 2018 fall midterm elections.
5. Sacramento State was ranked among the top third of all 23 CSU campuses in highest student voter registration in 2018.
6. In March of 2019, Secretary of State Alex Padilla recognized Sacramento State as ‘the campus with the most creative approach to registering students’ among all CSU campuses.

## Promoting Student Civic Engagement

1. Adopted the Sac State Vote Center and had the highest conditional voter turnout in the state
2. Hosted voter education events, including a Black and Brown Voter Summit, and voter registration drives
3. Record number of students attending the California Higher Education Student Summit = 33

### Number of Students Registered

In 2012 election year, 20,243 students were registered.

In 2016 election year, 22,546 students were registered.

#### By Gender

5,207 men and 7,844 women voted in the 2012 election (13,242 total).

6,190 men and 8,997 women voted in the 2016 election (15,189 total).

### Number of Students Registered

In 2014 election year, 17,944 students were registered.

In 2018 election year, 22,093 students were registered.

#### By Gender

2,157 men and 2,756 women voted in the 2014 election (4,937 total).
